

What is ALEKS?

Middle Tennessee State University uses ALEKS Placement Preparation and Learning (PPL) as a tool to help you succeed in your precalculus class. ALEKS PPL is a web-based program that uses artificial intelligence to map a student's strengths and weaknesses. The Assessment is up to 30 questions and generally takes 60-90 minutes to complete. After the Assessment, an individualized Prep and Learning Module is available to help you refresh your knowledge of important background topics. After completing the module, you will have several chances to retake the Assessment and improve your score.

ALEKS consists of three parts:

- An Initial Assessment
- The Prep and Learning Module, an individualized, self-paced online review
- Access to four additional Assessments

What is the point of ALEKS?

What is the purpose of the Initial Assessment? Your initial Assessment is a diagnostic tool. Your score on the first Assessment will allow ALEKS to develop a personalized Learning Module geared specifically toward topics you may not have seen before or that you need to review. After completing the review, you may retake the Assessment up to four additional times as a three-hour exam.

What does the Assessment score mean? Your initial Assessment result (overall score) is a number between 0 and 100. It represents the percentage of topics ALEKS has identified you have mastered. Through guided review and retakes, your goal is to get your Assessment as high as you can. Here is what your initial Assessment score means.¹

Your ALEKS Score	What the Score Means
76 – 100	You are ready for Calculus I
61 – 75	You need some review of precalculus topics
46 – 60	You need some review of algebra procedures
30 – 45	You need extensive review of algebra procedures
14 – 29	You need some review of arithmetic procedures before working on algebra skills
0 – 13	You need extensive review of arithmetic procedures before working on algebra skills

¹ If your score is below 60, we recommend that you consult with your advisor or instructor.

We encourage you to spend time in the Prep and Learning Module, even if the desired score is achieved, because time spent in ALEKS will ultimately lead to better preparation and improved grades.

How does my ALEKS score figure into my grade? ALEKS research has shown that an Assessment score of 76-100 correlates with preparation for Calculus I. Since you are enrolled in Calculus I, we expect you to ultimately earn an ALEKS score in this range. The contribution your ALEKS score makes will be 5% - 10% of your total grade. Exactly what percentage the grade contributes and exactly how the grade is computed depends on your instructor; that information will be included in your course syllabus. Improvement and scoring in the desired range are the important factors and will be reflected in how your ALEKS grade is computed.

Is there a deadline for finishing ALEKS PPL? Since you are enrolled in Calculus I, it is critical that you accomplish your ALEKS-based review soon as possible. Consequently, you must complete ALEKS PPL by mid-term. Any Assessments taken after mid-term will not be counted. The exact date will be provided in your syllabus.

Remember, there is a lot of background material important to Calculus I, and you need to be up-to-date on this material as soon as possible in order to get the most out of your class experience.

How should I use ALEKS PPL? The initial Assessment is designed to determine what you know and what you need to work on. The Assessment covers topics ranging from beginning algebra to precalculus and includes questions about basic number manipulation, algebra operations, functions, and trigonometry. As a student entering Calculus I, you are expected to be familiar with most of these topics, especially the algebra procedures and the basic trigonometry. We therefore consider ALEKS PPL to be a review companion for you at the beginning of the semester.

How you utilize ALEKS PPL after the initial Assessment is up to you. If you are happy with your initial score, you can keep it and do nothing. However, we encourage you to use the Learning Module as a guided review during the first half of the semester. We suggest retaking the Assessment after a week of review and follow up with additional review and Assessment attempts until mid-term.

Be honest. It is important that you take the Assessment seriously and give it an honest effort so that it truly reflects your current level of knowledge and math preparedness. Remember, the point of the Assessment is to help you succeed in your precalculus class. Cheating might get you a better score, but that alone won't help you pass precalculus – ultimately costing you time and money. Therefore, while taking the Assessment, you should not consult any outside sources for help (friends/family, internet searches, textbooks, notes etc...). FAQs

Preparation

Why take the ALEKS PPL Assessment? The initial Assessment is used to develop a personalized Learning Module specifically designed to help you quickly review background topics critical to Calculus I.

Who takes the ALEKS PPL Assessment? Everyone enrolled in Calculus I is expected to take the initial Assessment. The College of Basic and Applied Sciences will cover the cost of enrolling in ALEKS PPL.

When should I take the ALEKS PPL Assessment? It is critical that you get started early since ALEKS helps you review key math skills that you will need in your course. We expect you to take the initial Assessment during your first week of class; even sooner if possible. It is critical that you take the initial Assessment as soon as possible for two reasons. First, taking the Assessment early gives you a better chance of mastering background skills before they are needed in the course. Second, after taking the initial Assessment, you and your instructor or advisor may decide another course is a better fit for you. Changing courses is only possible in the first two weeks of the semester.

Is there a fee for using ALEKS PPL? The College of Basic and Applied Sciences will pay for your use of ALEKS. All you have to do is enroll. You will have access to ALEKS for one year after enrolling, with a maximum of five Assessment attempts.

Do I need to install any software or plug-ins prior to taking the ALEKS Assessment? No. There are no required plug-ins or applets required with your use of ALEKS PPL. As long as you have access to the internet and are using an updated browser, you should not experience difficulties in taking your Assessment. What topics are covered during the ALEKS PPL Assessment? ALEKS PPL is an online, adaptive system that covers a broad spectrum of mathematics topics. The length of the Assessment will vary, but can be up to 30 questions. You will see some, but not all, of the math you have learned in high school. It is a concept Assessment, not a preview of math courses at MTSU.

Topics covered:

- Real numbers (including fractions, integers, and percentages)
- Equations and inequalities (including linear equations, linear inequalities, systems of linear equations, and quadratic equations),
- Linear and quadratic functions (including graphs and functions, linear functions, and parabolas), exponents and polynomials (including integer exponents, polynomial arithmetic, factoring, and polynomial equations), rational expressions (including rational equations and rational functions)
- Radical expressions (including higher roots and rational exponents)
- Exponentials and logarithms (including function compositions and inverse functions, properties of logarithms, and logarithmic equations)
- Geometry and trigonometry (including perimeter, area, and volume, coordinate geometry, trigonometric functions, and identities and equations).

Can I practice using the ALEKS input tools before I begin the Assessment? ALEKS will begin with a brief tutorial to make sure you are comfortable with the math palette tools before your Assessment begins. The tutorial shows you how to enter different types of answers, how to use the ALEKS calculator, and how to graph. If you aren't sure how to input an answer, or need help while you are taking the ALEKS Assessment, select the **Help** button below the answer pallet tools. Going to the tutorial during your Assessment will NOT impact your Assessment results.

Taking the Assessment

What is the format of the questions on ALEKS? ALEKS is not a multiple-choice Assessment. It is open-response and requires you to work out solutions with a paper and pencil, and then enter them into ALEKS. Be sure to have scratch paper with you.

May I use a calculator while using ALEKS? ALEKS will provide an on-screen calculator if you need one to complete a particular problem. Otherwise, you may not use a calculator.

May I use any other resources during an Assessment? You may only use a pen or pencil, paper, and the resources provided within ALEKS. Remember, the point of the Assessment is to help you succeed in your Calculus I class. You should not receive assistance from friends, family, other websites, textbooks, or any other resource not provided by ALEKS. Receiving assistance is a violation of MTSU's Student Code.

Can I review a question after I've answered it? Because ALEKS is adaptive, once you submit an answer, you cannot change it. Be sure to carefully check your answer before submitting your response.

What if I see questions I don't know? It is likely that you will be asked a few questions on material you have not yet learned. On such questions it is appropriate to answer, **I don't know**. On any question that you have familiarity with, however, it is important to do your best. **I don't know** is interpreted by ALEKS to mean that you do not know how to solve the topic, and this will be reflected in the Assessment results. There is no penalty for incorrectly answering a question on the Assessment, it only helps ALEKS understand what you know and don't know.

Are Assessments timed? You will have three hours to complete the initial Assessment. You will also have three hours to complete each subsequent Assessment. If you need to exit the Assessment for any reason, you will be able to log back in and pick up where you left off.

Are Assessments supervised? ALEKS assessments are not supervised (they are unproctored). We trust you to do your own work. Remember, the assessment process is designed to help you succeed in your course; cheating on the assessments goes against your best interests.

What happens if I do not complete an Assessment in the allotted time? If you do not submit your Assessment in the allotted time, the Assessment will reset; and you will have to start over. Starting over does not affect the number of retakes you have remaining.

Where can I see my score?

- You will receive your score immediately upon completion of your Assessment.
- Your ALEKS score can be viewed by re-entering ALEKS using the same access link for which you took the Assessment.
- Your numeric scores are periodically added into Pipeline and are accessible to your instructor. Your instructor will not have access to any other data from your ALEKS account.

Can I retake the ALEKS PPL Assessment? Yes, you may take up to five Assessments, including the initial Assessment. However, to make each attempt worthwhile, it is important that you spend time working in your ALEKS Prep and Learning Module between Assessments so that you can improve your skills. You must wait at least 48 hours between Assessments, and you are required to spend a minimum of three hours in your Learning Module before attempting a second Assessment. The amount of time required decreases between subsequent Assessments.

Assessment	Minimum Required Time in Learning Module Before Retaking Assessment
Second Assessment	Three hours
Third Assessment	Three Hours
Fourth Assessment	Two Hours
Fifth Assessment	Two Hours

Prep and Learning Modules

How long do I have access to my Prep and Learning Module? You will have six months of access to your Prep and Learning module. Access to the prep course will not begin until you select **start** on the top of your screen. DO NOT select into the Prep and Learning Module until you are ready to start working.

Is there an additional fee for my Prep and Learning Module? Access to a Prep and Learning Module is included along with the additional Assessments.

Must I work in my ALEKS Prep and Learning Module between Assessments? You can retake the Assessment up to four additional times to improve your score. Students are required to work in the Prep and Learning Modules for a minimum amount of time prior to each Assessment to increase success.

What are ALEKS Knowledge Checks? While working in a Prep and Learning Module, you will periodically complete a Knowledge Check to make sure you have mastered the topics you gained in Learning Mode. If you do not show mastery during the Knowledge Check, the topics will be added back into your Learning Pie so you can review them again.

Does progress in an ALEKS Prep and Learning Module count an Assessment score? No. You must complete a new Assessment to change your Assessment score. Select the placement tab in the upper right corner of the ALEKS page to start a new Assessment.

Technical Support

What do I do if my web browser gets stuck or my computer crashes while I'm taking the Assessment? Simply close the browser, or log out and log back in. ALEKS will resume the Assessment exactly where you left off, with no loss of your previous answers.
