As you discuss these cases, be sure to address the following questions:

- a. What issue is being addressed by the court in this opinion?
 - b. What test does the court identify as applicable to this issue?
 - c. How does the court apply the test to the facts of the case?
 - d. How are these cases similar? How are they different, or distinguishable, from each other? Are there differences in the tests applied by these courts? If so, explain how the tests are different, and propose possible reasons why you think the courts may have approached these cases differently.
3. Read “Reviewing the Court System” and answer questions. Also answer all Questions.

 - a. What is the “sliding scale” standard and how does it apply to jurisdictional questions regarding internet based businesses? What are some examples of its application?
